The Semi-Final Rounds of Prajatantra 2023 took place successfully on September 16 and 17, 2023. We are delighted to share that out of the 343 registered teams, 163 teams were qualified to the Semi-Final Rounds. These teams represented a total of 53 Cities, 24 States, and 3 Union Territories. We observed notable growth in the enthusiasm and maturity of the participants as they assumed roles such as mayors, committee chairpersons, and elected representatives. Prajatantra 2023, National Youth Festival has been organised by Praja Foundation in collaboration with the National Institute of Urban Affairs (NIUA) and with the support of UN-Habitat and Friedrich Nauman Foundation South Asia.

Exploring this year's theme of 'Inclusive and Participatory Urban Economies', we noticed a stronger emphasis on sustainable and equitable development, as well as gender equality. It was encouraging to see the clear vision of participants for addressing the challenges faced by cities and the effective strategies proposed to resolve them using local resources.

Beyond the competitive presentations, it was truly gratifying to engage with participants during and after the event. Gaining insights into their concerns, experiences, and feedback was a valuable learning experience for our organising team. Some participants also shared personal stories of advocating for local issues, and nothing made us prouder than witnessing them take on the role of active citizens. Their revised presentations already reflect a more practical approach, and we are confident that they will carry forward these lessons on their journey ahead.

We look forward to meeting them as future leaders and changemakers in their cities.


KNOWLEDGE SESSION 5:

MAYOR'S SPEECH

Fine-tuning their presentations since the Qualifying Round, participants representing mayors from different cities in India gathered in the Semi-Final to exchange their ideas, visions, and aspirations for their upcoming terms. Many of the delivered speeches emphasised the development of their cities while preserving local cultures as a central theme.

Mayors highlighted various initiatives during their speeches, such as creating policies to support street vendors in Surat, which would enhance the city's street food culture, and empowering local artisans in Mysore to boost the arts and crafts sector of the city's economy. They stressed the importance of involving local entrepreneurial communities to foster inclusive and participatory urban economies within their jurisdictions.

Moreover, many mayors recognised the significance of coordination between the City Government and the State Government. They discussed the need to establish communication channels with state government agencies to ensure a synchronised approach to improved governance.

The policies presented by our semi-finalists were broad and inclusive, covering a wide range of laws and regulations. These policies were also up to date, aligning with the current needs of our citizens.

Key highlights of Policy Presentation

Urban Economy

- Introducing smart contracts for licensing, social transfers, and leasing.
- Investing in public infrastructure creates jobs, improves quality of life, and helps businesses thrive.
- Skills Training: Training programs for in-demand skills help workers secure better-paying jobs and meet employer needs.
- Entrepreneur Support: Financial, technical, and mentoring support can help entrepreneurs start and grow businesses that meet urban needs.

The policy debate centred on the role of city governments in promoting economic development and enhancing the well-being of citizens. Both the proponents and opponents presented a range of arguments to explore different facets of their main argument.

The discussion focused on the connection between efficient service delivery and economic development, reinforcing the principle of subsidiarity. This principle emphasises the roles of city governments in delivering public services effectively and contributing to broader policy development, in coordination with State and Union Governments.

Debaters also made effective use of quotations from thinkers, leaders, and changemakers to support their arguments. They also cited case studies from cities in India and around the world to further illustrate how empowering city governments can strengthen urban economies.

Government: City government should only be a Service Delivery Agency.


Opposition: City government should also be Responsible for economic development.

The Prajatantra Quiz has been designed with the aim of fostering intellectual curiosity among participants regarding topics related to the Indian Constitution, Urban Governance, and the Economy, which significantly impact our daily lives.
