We are pleased to announce that, Praja in collaboration with the National Institute of Urban Affairs (NIUA) is celebrating Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav, the 75th year of Independence of India, through **Prajatantra 2022-23**. Prajatantra is a National Youth Festival that enables the youth of India to advocate their beliefs, opinions and understanding of city governance. It facilitates the youth to participate in large numbers across India. It also encourages participants to form and function as a Model city government through various competitions such as Mayor's Speech, Policy Presentations, Debate and Quiz competition. As we go ahead with this journey, we are happy to announce that we have successfully completed the Quarter Final Round of Prajatantra 2022-23 and now we all are eagerly waiting for the results. The Semi-Final round will be held on 10th September 2022 and the Grand Finale will be held in Delhi in Physical form in January 2023.



It is essential to understand the workings of our urban institutions and its challenges to be able to actively participate in local democracy. **Prajatantra 2022-23** created a stage for the youth of India to think, examine and impart their considerations and insights on issues of urban governance. The core objective of this festival is to mobilise young leaders across India and help them to understand the importance of democracy & functioning of a democratic government to increase their active participation in governance.

This year we are conducting the 4th season of the Prajatantra festival and it is truly representing the entire country's youth. 216 teams including more than 1000 participants across 23 States, 5 Union Territories and 79 different cities including metropolises as well as emerging towns registered for the event. 



The session was moderated by Prof Debolina Kundu, Professor, National Institute of Urban Affairs with expert speaker Mr Tikender Singh Panwar, former Deputy Mayor of, Shimla city.

The second knowledge session was on Municipal Finance that featured Dr Debarpita Roy, Research Fellow at the Centre for Social and Economic Progress (CSEP), New Delhi as the expert Moderator and Dr Ravikant Joshi, Urban Finance and Management Specialist & Former Chief Accounts Officer of Vadodara Municipal Corporation, as the expert Speaker. These knowledge sessions led interesting discussions between students & the expert speakers. We will be soon organising two more interesting knowledge sessions.

The question of municipal leadership is of great significance in urban governance across India. In many countries, a mayor is the highest-ranking official in a municipal government of a city. Worldwide, there is a wide variance in local laws and customs regarding the powers and responsibilities of a mayor as well as the means by which a mayor is elected or otherwise mandated.

In the **Mayor's Speech Competition**, participants were expected to present their precise vision as a mayor of the city including the main goal of the government for the betterment of the city. Participants effectively highlighted preparedness for city policy, good governance and a futuristic view.

The presentations during the mayoral speech not only highlighted the issues our cities are facing but also came up with innovative solutions to overcome these problems, for instance, how converting non-recyclable materials into electricity and heat could generate energy source and reduces carbon emissions by offsetting the need for energy from fossil sources. All the participants beautifully presented comprehensive policy frameworks that highlighted major decisions and changes in the administrative structure.



During the Mayoral speeches, participants exhibited a very good understanding of urban governance. They also presented their vision as mayor for the betterment of the city. Judges were amazed to see a futuristic view of the candidates and also shared their insights and experiences with the participants throughout the event.

Debates truly cherish the idea of democracy. Freedom of speech and differences of opinions are from the many ideals of democracy, and these were nurtured in this debate competition.

Prajatantra 2022-23 had two topics around which participants shared their perspectives. The first topic of the **Debate Competition** was "Should Urban Local Body levy user charges for Solid Waste Management Services from citizens or should generate its revenue through efficient solid waste management" and the second topic was "Should the mayor be elected directly (by citizens) or indirectly through (municipal councilors)". For each team, topics were selected using the chit-box method.

All the participants presented their views with a solutionoriented approach that reflected their critical thinking ability. Be it for the motion or against they defended their positions and gave their unique perspectives. This competition was successful in engaging the youth with the topic via a research and solution-oriented approach, comparing both pros and cons of the assigned topic.

Municipal Finance - By Sanyukt Bhartiya Party (Shrevash Kanhed

Local government is a constitutional sphere of government.. The legal framework for local government is contained in Chapter 7 of the Constitution of 1996 (SA 1996). Section 151 of the Constitution makes provision for the establishment of municipalities "for the whole of the territory of the Republic.

Objectives of Local Government:

- Provide democratic and accountable government.
- Ensure provision of service to communities in a sustainable manner Promote social and economic development. Promote a safe and healthy environment.
- - Encourage the involvement of communities and community organisations in matters of local government.



In the Quarter Final, we conducted two rounds of **Policy** Presentation Competition; the first was on e-Governance & Citizen Participation and the second was on Municipal Finance.

1. e-Governance & Citizen Participation

Citizen Participation is the core of democracy and it will always be the most significant aspect of Governance. This first policy presentation competition revolved around issues like digital illiteracy, accessibility of digital facilities, sustainability and security of digital interference hindering effective governance.

The solutions and perspectives of participants on the use of an Online Grievance Redressal Mechanism and a citizen-friendly transition to e-governance were impressive.

2. Municipal Finance

Municipal Finance plays a vital role in acquiring the financial resources required for an economy to achieve its social welfare.

In this competition, participants formulated policies on one of the most important dimensions of present-day governance. Policy presentation on Municipal Finance was a platform for participants to present their vision with respect to the budgeting of an urban local body. Also, it boosted conceptual knowledge among the participants with respect to policymaking and budgeting at the city level. Apart from the existing property tax, user charges and other fees as our revenue base Participants suggested the use of other income sources such as consumption-based taxation and income-based taxation like a professional tax to provide buoyancy to revenues which were commendable. These new revenue sources will reduce the dependency on State Government and can be leveraged to borrow and meet our capital expenditure requirements.
